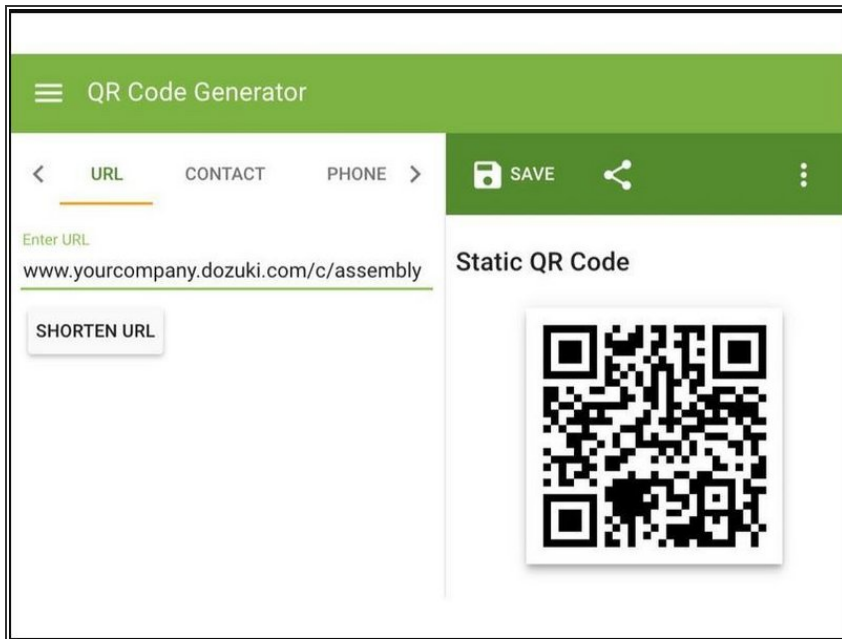

Step 2 — Mobile Documentation Apps



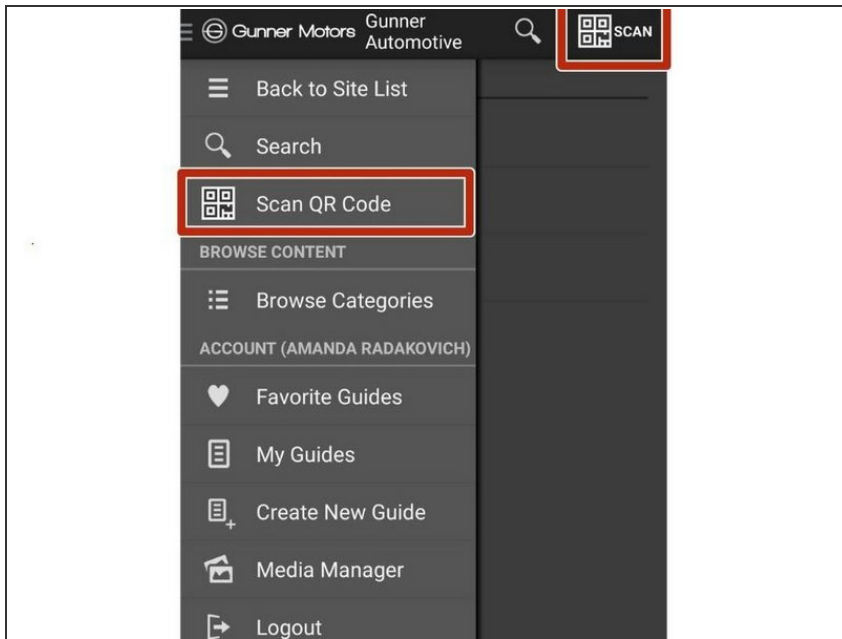
- QR codes reading

Step 4 — QR codes from the APP



- Inside the APP or the website(portal) there will be an option to SCAN
- Once on there, the APP/WEB will use the camera from the device to scan it.
- The guide will appear in few seconds.
- It will save time once the QR codes are placed with the right label to the instructions they refer to.

- Add the avocado tree or any other device to start your own guide and see how it feels to work in this environment.

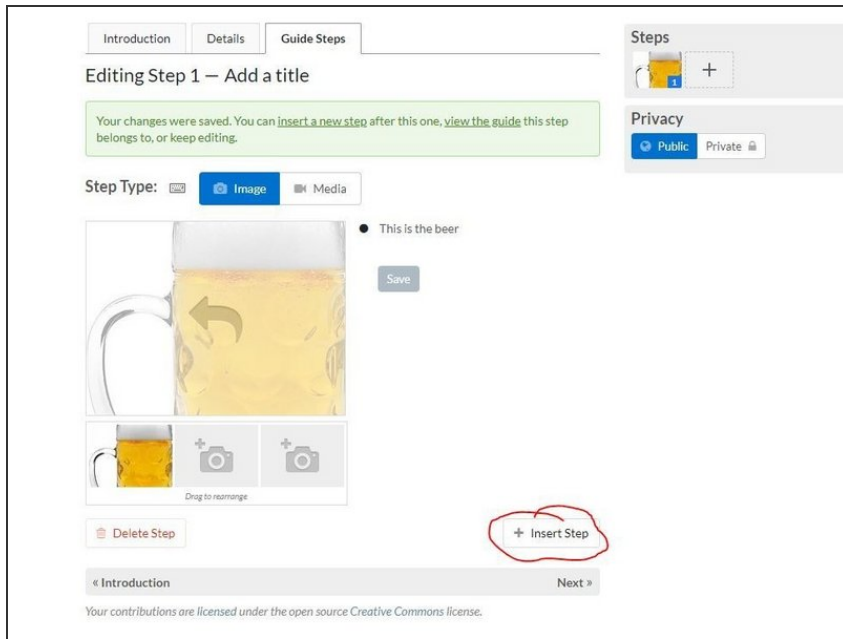

- Click on Create a Guide

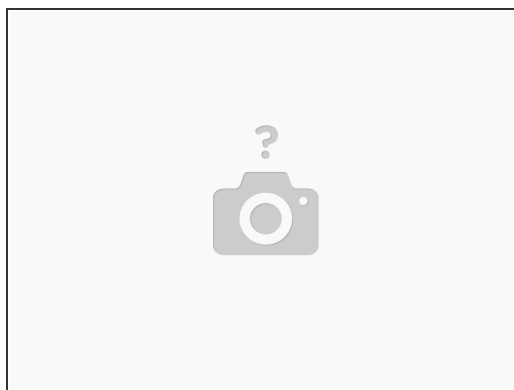
- How to spot a non optimised instruction?

Step 9



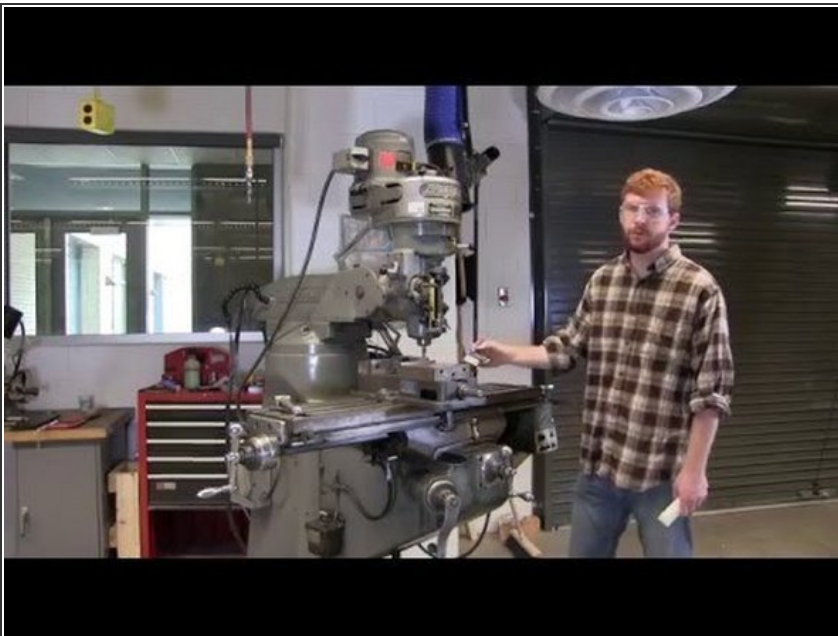
- As example for this Open Source environment you can add a missing step by just creating a new step that goes to the end by default.

Step 11 — Examples of training



- As example of the versatility of this tool. The sharp man could write the steps and take photos of how to operate the machines. Lathe, mill, cutter.
- The guide/manuals/instructions won't be for basic tutorial and basic learning, it will be for the max expertise. But could it be for entry level as well if needed.
- Every single thing every knowledge any trick would be recorded in videos and photos we small explanations. If he retires soon, all his expertise visually, organised and available at any moment. It will be ready for any person taking his role after him.

- Because it will always be a real time, updated guide. The guide only gets updated as long as the machines are always the same.
- Once when someone reaches his expertise will be able to add more knowledge and expertise to that guide. Therefore the efficiency and usability of the guides will only increase.
- There won't be more: ah the sharp guy is not today/available, CNC guy is not today/available. Anyone from tooling will have a visual very well explain guide from the master of that tool, to follow and be as good as the master of that tool.
- The shorter and more clear the videos the better. If an explanation or a part of the video is not clear or can be explained better it is easier to update and modify the shorter are each step. Instead of redoing a video of 5 to 20 mins, you just record 30 secs of explanation rather than a 20 mins long. That is the philosophy of this tool.
- The philosophy is to have more than words, images and videos are more efficient. But small and short enough to keep things clear, to be able to follow small steps Steps shorter than 1 minute. Any longer explanation has to be break in very short easy to upgrade steps.

In order to enjoy and experience a new way of doing documentation and assembly instructions. Please follow these steps.
